

Review of the CICA Professional Standards for Australian Career Development Practitioners

Briefing Paper 3

What the Updated Professional Standards Mean for Practitioners and Stakeholders

The updated Professional Standards for Australian Career Development Practitioners reflect the evolving context in which career development services are delivered.

The revised Standards emphasise that technology can assist practice but cannot substitute the professional judgement, ethical responsibility, and relational expertise of career development practitioners.

What the Updated Standards Mean for Professional Development

The revised Professional Standards emphasise the significance of Continuing Professional Development (CPD) as a vital aspect of upholding professional competence.

While the minimum CPD requirement stays the same, practitioners are encouraged to participate in learning that supports current practice and future workforce growth.

Areas of professional learning may include:

- Digital literacy and emerging technologies
- Ethical use of artificial intelligence
- Labour market trends and workforce transitions
- Inclusive and culturally responsive practices
- New approaches to service delivery.

The Standards emphasise that professional learning should support both individual practitioner growth and the wider development of the profession.

What the Updated Standards Mean for Employers

For employers and organisations that provide career development services, the revised Standards offer a clear and modern framework for workforce capability.

The Professional Standards support organisations by:

- defining the competencies required of qualified career development practitioners
- reinforcing expectations around ethical and client-centred practice
- providing a benchmark for recruitment and professional development
- supporting quality assurance within career development services.

Organisations employing career development practitioners can utilise the Standards to guide workforce planning, staff development, and service design.

What the Updated Standards Mean for Education and Training Providers

Education providers who deliver career development qualifications are vital in preparing the next generation of practitioners.

The revised Professional Standards offer guidance for curriculum development to ensure qualifications stay aligned with current professional practice.

Training programs are encouraged to include learning that supports:

- Labour market analysis and workforce trends
- Inclusive and accessible service delivery.

By aligning training with the Professional Standards, education providers help ensure that graduates are ready to enter professional practice with the necessary knowledge and skills for the field.

For governments, policymakers, and other stakeholders, the revised Professional Standards enhance the credibility and profile of the career development profession.

The Standards provide a clear framework that demonstrates:
